Parent Observation Checklist

Understanding Your Child's Interests, Strengths, and High Potential Beyond the Classroom

This checklist is designed to guide your observations of your child in everyday life. Giftedness and high potential often reveal themselves in natural settings; through play, conversations, reactions, and passions. Use this tool to reflect on what you notice and begin to build a fuller picture of your child's emerging abilities.

Tick the statements that regularly or sometimes apply to your child.

1. Curiosity and Thinking Style

- My child asks deep or unusual questions beyond what is typical for their age.
- They are curious about how things work, why people behave the way they do, or the meaning behind things.
- They enjoy making connections between unrelated ideas or concepts.
- They often see patterns or inconsistencies that others overlook.
- They prefer open-ended activities over tasks with only one correct answer.
- They show strong opinions or ideas and are eager to explain them.

2. Emotional and Social Awareness

- My child shows strong empathy toward others, animals, or social issues.
- They express concern about fairness, justice, or ethics.
- They feel emotions intensely and may react strongly to criticism or change.
- They form deep attachments to people, ideas, or causes.
- They may prefer the company of older children or adults.
- They are highly aware of social dynamics and may notice when others are uncomfortable or excluded.

3. Creativity and Imagination
 My child frequently invents stories, characters, or fantasy worlds.
 They enjoy role-playing, dramatic expression, or visual art.
 They approach problems in original or unexpected ways.
 They create new games, rules, or designs rather than follow existing ones

4. Focus and Intensity

- My child can become deeply absorbed in a task or interest for long periods.
- They may struggle to shift attention when immersed in something they enjoy.
- They become frustrated or impatient when others cannot keep up with their ideas.
- They show perfectionist tendencies or fear of making mistakes.
- They express boredom or resistance when tasks feel too easy or repetitive.

5. Learning Preferences and Interests

6. Physical and Sensory Indicators

- My child shows heightened awareness of sensory input (e.g. textures, sounds, light, clothing discomfort).
- They excel in physical coordination, movement, or rhythm.
- They use body language or hands-on interaction to explore the world.
- They may become overwhelmed in highly stimulating environments.

7. Identity and Self-Awareness

- My child demonstrates strong self-awareness, often reflecting on who they are and how they feel.
- They ask questions about identity, belonging, and purpose.
- They express interest in gender, culture, or social roles in ways that go beyond peer norms.
- They seem driven by a desire to understand their place in the world.
- They experience internal conflict when they feel misunderstood or overlooked.

8. Twice-Exceptionality and Masking

- My child shows strengths in one area but struggles significantly in another (e.g. great verbal reasoning but difficulty with handwriting or attention).
- They may hide their abilities or emotions to blend in socially.
- Their behaviour can seem contradictory, advanced in one moment, overwhelmed in the next.
- Teachers may not recognise the same strengths that I see at home.
